The Department of English is proposing a change in Course Description and Course Title for ENG 7700

Course Description Change

FROM:

An introduction to African-American literature in the United States from 1940 to the present. Works studied span a variety of genres, from poetry and rap lyrics to realist fiction; themes may include identity, freedom and responsibility, individualism and community.

TO:

The course provides an overview of early African-American literature from the pre-emancipation era to the Harlem Renaissance. Genres such as oral and slave narratives, poetry, fiction and nonfiction will be covered.

Rationale for Change:

The new course description provides a more accurate, focused, and historically aligned overview of the course content. It moves away from the incongruous emphasis on post-1940s literature and modern themes, instead centering on the key historical and literary periods suggested by the course title. This change will give students a clearer understanding of what to expect from the course and ensures the course content matches the title.

TO: African-American Literature: Beginnings to the Harlem

Renaissance

Rationale for Change:

The updated course title provides clarity regarding the historical range, emphasizes key literary movements, and gives students a better understanding of what they will study. The new title is more precise, appealing, and aligned with academic expectations for studying African-American literary history.
