As you design your course for a distance education format, please remember that students with disabilities need to fully access your course materials. The most common types of disabilities fall into the following groups:

- 1. Vision Impairment/Learning Disabilities: formatting your documents correctly will allow screen readers to access the content and have text read aloud.
- 2. Hearing Impairment: all videos should have closed captions, or as a second-best option a transcript of the audio content available.
- 3. Mental health/Intellectual/Autism spectrum: documents should be kept simple and organized.
