3 hours 3 credits

Prerequisite: FD 2100 - Open only to FD majors.

Required for AAS in Fashion Design.

Course Structure

Mastering the skills of flat pattern drafting and manipulation for womenswear.

Basic pattern manipulation techniques including dart manipulation contoured seaming, and the slash and spread method are covered.

Required Materials

Students are required to provide their own muslin, pattern paper, oaktag, scissors, transparent ruler, tracing wheel, French curve pencils and as needed throughout the semester.

Goals and Teaching Methods

The two major techniques of fashion design, draping and flat pattern drafting, will be presented.

The instructor will demonstrate techniques and terminology. Students will then duplicate the techniques on their own and produce their own patterns.

Techniques will include: darting, gathering, shirring, pleating and various other methods of contouring fabric to control fullness, and design garments. Seaming, seam finishes, and advance pattern design will be covered. Design of closures and allowances will be presented. Collars and sleeves will also be covered, as well as facings and interfacings.

Outcomes:

- 1. Use a professional draping dress form.
- 2. Use professional drafting equipment.
- 3. Cut pattern into muslin to analyze the fit by adjusting the patterns.
- 4. Produce final paper patterns that are complete, trued (matched) and sewn into sample form.
- 5. Mark patterns in a legible, professional manner.
- 6. Show all construction details on a pattern.
- 7. Determine grainlines and control them in all designs.
- 8. Understand the basics of fit.
- 9. Manipulate patterns using flat pattern techniques.
- 10. Criticize designs as they are developed on the form.

Students will produce their own master patterns (slopers) for bodices, skirts, pants and dresses. The slopers will then be used to generate original designs by each student.

Grading

Student's grades will be determined by the quality of their slopers and the resulting designs. A written final will cover terminology and drafting patterns.

The instructor will then check each student's work, and offer assistance as required. Students will be allowed to complete their assignments at home.

Class Projects (75%)

All class projects and assignments must be submitted for grading on the date it is due.

- 1. Quality of patterns: creative use of proportion and balance.
- 2. Final: Drafting a pattern / written exam

In Class Evaluation (15%)

- 1. Ability to follow directions
- 2. Cooperation: willing to listen to critiques and apply suggestions in order to improve.
- 3. Class performance based on understanding of material and skill in application.

Professionalism (10%)

- 1. Courtesy shown towards instructor and fellow students.
- 2. Preparation: Readiness and motivation to work with the appropriate supplies on hand at all times.
